

improve Cloudester Green bus station with grass and trees

resist superstores - these are unsightly and take trade away from small local shops, as well as contributing to the traffic problem

increase the number of allotments

plant more trees

HOWSING

encourage the renovation of old properties insulation and conservation of energy (including solar panels) should be encouraged by lower rates council houses for sale should be sold at the market rate, and the money used to provide more council housing

HEALTH

small, human-scale units are preferable to large bureaucratic Mospital buildings (the Cowley Road Hospital should remain open)

encourage, by education and subsidised classes at community health centres, a more positive approach to health and exercise

regular monitoring of lead levels in inner city areas with pressure for the control of lead in petrol (there is evidence of a link between lead levels and brain damage in children)
