THE SUMMER SHAPES UP WELL. The Roadshow's on the road; the Green Field at Glastonbury was a considerable success; Stonehenge festival puts out a new and positive vibe; news comes in from all quarters of Peace Camps, actions, and gatherings; and there's a fresh mood of optimism over stopping cruise at Molesworth. Last summer, somehow, nothing quite went right - the potential for great things was there, but they just refused to materialise. This year, so far, it's different.

We'd hoped to get this mailing together on site at Glastonbury. We failed to do so; but as a result I can pass on a few reflections after the event. In particular we achieved what we set out to do - to create a relatively clean, quiet space on the periphery of the annual turmoil. Even the litter was kept under control - unheard of before at Glastonbury. And we were noticed and appreciated.

When we first arrived on site before the event, we were immediately struck by the difference between our way of doing things and that of the festival hierarchy (for hierarchy, unfortunately, it is). It led to points of friction. The Greens, we soon realised, were nothing but a bloody hassle; or else regarded with derision. At by the end, for the record, we were considered "good value and an asset to the festival". Thanks to everyone who came and took part and contributed.

The key to all this, I believe, is that we managed to generate a sense of common identity and community. And this, I am sure, must be our approach to the new politics which needs to be created if this Thatcher-torn, conflict-ridden land of ours is ever to be healed; to put personal inter-relationships and community spirit before ideology, even before programmes and strategies. To put feelings before ideas.

Here endeth the sermon. The sun is shining and it's time to move on further. If a direction was pointed from Glastonbury, it led towards Molesworth. 'Harvest for the Hungry', a harvest festival, planting, and Green Gathering, begins on August 25th. It promises to be a Gathering in the real sense of the word, and one not to be forgotten.

NOTES

COLLECTIVE MEETING. No Collective meeting has been fixed at present, though effectively one will take place at the INNER GATHERING which is being organised by Robert Fielder at Leominster at the end of July/beginning of August (see facing page).

Besides the themes suggested by Robert, there is some important outstanding business to be discussed; in particular:

We should by then have a substantial financial donation for the Collective, in respect of our contribution to the Glastonbury CNF festival. This will need to be apportioned and put to good use.

We will need to discuss how to make the maximum contribution to the Molesworth 'Harvest for the Hungry' event which begins on August 25th (see elsewhere in this mailing for details).

The Green Field at Glastonbury was a success; but with regard to next year, opinion is divided as to whether providing a Green presence at the CND festival is an important thing to continue, or whether the festival as a whole has become too large and commercial and we are best off out of it. This needs to be discussed.

Please note that numbers are strictly limited at Leominster; so come if you want to get involved, but please don't bring a busload of friends expecting a holiday.

USING THE MAILING. The mailing is open to all subscribers to include material publicising projects, groups and events which you are involved in. The most effective way of doing this is to include an A4 flyer which can be collated in with the duplicated sheets.

At present we have a print run of 250, going out to subscribers, inquirers, and other interested people; so half a ream of printed leaflets will help to brighten up the mailing and will get information to 250 potentially interested people.

The material covers all aspects of putting on a Gathering, and is arranged in sections covering: Working as a Collective; Finance and Budgeting; Press and Publicity; Police and Local Authorities; Site Arrangements and Site Management; Site Kitchen; Gate; Health and Welfare; Information; Workshops; Entertainments; Stalls; Site Service and Facilities.

The sections are printed on different coloured paper for easy reference, and are designed so that they can be divided up between the different members of an organising group.

After successful gigs at Thorpe Tree Fair, Coventry Peace Festival and Boscombe Down Festival, the next venues are:

All told the Roadshow will claim at a standard gig for ...
10 vehicles at 10p per mile per vehicle, ie £1.00 per mile
20 peoples' food at £1.50 per head per day, ie £30 per day.

Continuum Theatre and Planet Waves will arrange their own bookings and expenses and try to be at many of the larger gigs on the tour, to be seen as part of the Green Roadshow, the only limitation being on the time that we actually spend with each other on the road; therefore work we can do together will be limited to more improvisational stuff.

There are several other people who have expressed interest in joining up with the Roadshow. If they have something positive to offer and can be independent, for the time being, they will be most welcome to join up and make the show more varied, full, representative, and productive.

There has already been a lot of interest expressed in booking the Roadshow for next year ... Maybe we will get a chance to discuss the ideas for next year along the way, especially at the Leominster gig which has as one of its themes "Green strategies for 1985", in which we may also get feedback from the rest of the Green Collective on how they see us.

The feedback I have had from the gigs we have done up until now has been very good. All have said they liked what we did and have felt that we added a lot to the overall event ... imagine how it could be when we know each other better and can work together more. The potential is still amazing and there is much work to do.

A Harvest Festival, Planting and Green Gathering at USAF Molesworth.

The anti-cruise campaign seems to be languishing in a sort of post-Greenham haze. Many seem to think that we must now shift the whole focus of the peace campaign towards Trident and non-nuclear defence because the cruise campaign has been lost. In fact the reverse seems to be the case; the political climate is shifting in our favour, and more than before we now have a real possibility of stopping cruise.

The Dutch decision to postpone deployment, increasing talk of 'Europeanisation' and increasing the nuclear threshold, the forthcoming Presidential elections and the growth of support in opinion polls: these all indicate a change in climate that could lead to a cancellation of further deployment. This has to be the first step before we can expect to remove missiles already in place.

Molesworth is Britain's second cruise missile base; it is also virtually empty. Unlike Greenham Common it is an open, largely disused base. As work is scheduled to start on the base next February, any large-scale action or Gathering on the base needs to be organised this year. The other more important reason for stepping up pressure at Molesworth this year lies in the psychology of the Government. The nearer the date for deployment (1988), the more they will batten down the hatches and reject the cancellation option. It is interesting that the Dutch are debating their cruise deployment now, two years ahead of the arrival date.

For these reasons and others, the Green Collective, Molesworth Peace Camp and the Molesworth Wheat to the Starving campaign (with the support of the local CND group) have come together to organise a large-scale Gathering on the base this August. The Gathering will begin on the 25th and has no finishing date.

During the Gathering we hope to be harvesting wheat that was sown on the base over Easter. It's destined for Eritrea, in the Horn of Africa, to help feed the thousands who face starvation there this winter. We shall also be ploughing for winter wheat and planting other vegetables. We want to make the link with those who are already dying because of resources being wasted on the arms race. Globally, one person in eight faces starvation.

On Sunday September 2nd we shall be dedicating a new peace chapel 'EIRENE' (Greek for Peace) on the base. Please join us in this celebration, no matter what beliefs you hold. Together we can focus our energies on transforming the purpose of USAF Molesworth from destruction to creation, from death to life.

On September 14th and 15th there will be an action at nearby USAF Alconbury, the command centre for cruise deployment at Molesworth.

In the absence of a Glastonbury Green Gathering, the Green Collective is calling on greens everywhere to make this their main gathering point of the year. We want to show that peace is more than disarmament, that it starts with our attitudes towards each other and towards the environment. We're planning workshops, entertainments and displays to make these links.

Please discuss Harvest for the Hungry with your peace group or green group, and let us know what kind of help you can offer us or we can offer you. If Molesworth is to become a major international focus for the peace movement, it's vital that groups should visit the base and begin making plans. The Gathering won't be all work though; we also expect it to be great fun, with theatre, clowning, music and healing.

Given the nature of the event we cannot charge people for coming, and will therefore have great difficulty in financing it. Please send what you can afford, as soon as possible.

We shall provide basic amenities like toilets, as well as some entertainments and pre-planned discussion groups; but the main onus of this Gathering has to be on those groups that come. Please come as self-sufficient as you can, remembering that things like fire wood and water will be a problem, and pre-plan what your group's contribution might be.

And Further Plans ...

The United States Congress has just agreed to a provisional budget of fifteen million dollars to be spent in 1985 on the construction of another Greenham Common in Britain. The conversion of a disused airfield at Molesworth in Cambridgeshire is to begin in February of next year, in preparation for the deployment of 64 cruise missiles there in 1988.

Meanwhile, three thousand miles away in the Horn of Africa, over a million people face starvation due to serious drought conditions and a war of genocide being waged against them. Fifteen million dollars of emergency relief aid to Eritrea could feed every one of these people through the winter and save that country from unprecedented catastrophe.

When are we going to get our priorities straight? When are the Great Industrial Nations going to stop squandering their wealth on this enormous arms build-up and start caring for the real needs of people? How much longer can the nuclear arms race continue unchecked before it destroys us all?

These are questions which we will be asking at Molesworth on October 20th. We need your help and support in bringing them to the attention of all those who sincerely desire peace. Surely the time has come to put aside all our differences and join together with one voice to say "Enough is enough! The arms race stops at Molesworth. Let the peace race begin!"

In fact, a small crop of spring wheat is now growing on an acre of Molesworth airfield. This wheat was sown by hand on Easter Sunday by about three hundred people representing peace groups, environmental groups, churches and Third World groups from all over Britain (as well as a few from Holland and Germany). This wheat is to be harvested in September and sent on October 20th to Eritrea. Additional contributions of wheat and other non-perishable foods, including tins, will be collected for shipment by the Eritrean Relief Association. A crop of winter wheat will also be sown at Molesworth on that day.

Can you help us ensure that Molesworth Fields are used to save lives rather than to destroy them? We are asking local groups as well as national organisations to add their names to our list of sponsors for the international rally on October 20th and if at all possible to send a representative to an organisational meeting at 3 pm on Sunday July 8th, at Molesworth Fields (just north of Brington on the B660 off the A604 between Kettering and Huntingdon). Transport could be provided from Huntingdon station if required.

If you are unable to commit yourself to the rally at this point, perhaps you could consider helping in other ways. The collection of food for Eritrea is just one project whereby we are trying both to help people in need, directly, and also to raise public awareness about the choice before us - a choice literally between life and death.



PEACE ON MERSEYSIDE... '84

The visit of the annual International Garden Festival to Liverpool this year has triggered off a chain-reaction within local Alternative Groups. Although the Garden Festival was Michael Heseltine's initiative (when he was Special Minister For Merseyside), the great social issues which the staging of this event raises: Land Reclamation...The 'Greening' of Inner Towns and Cities...International Co-operation... Community Politics...these Issues plus a healthy amount of talk in local hostels & press... and then a certain amount of work, in terms of architecture, landscaping, horticulture, outdoor pursuits, the visual & performing arts, community fieldwork etc...all combine to make a Fringe Festival of quite astonishing scale. The offices of "Fringe '84" (the official Fringe!) are a blaze of activity...and so full is their calendar that they now have a moratorium on New Events!

Meantime, the Peace Festival has set up a Shop and Festival Office at 91, Whitechapel in the heart of Liverpool. We have the backing of our City Council and are in touch with over fifty local Peace, Animal Rights, Conservation and similar groups throughout the Merseyside area and beyond.

We are developing exhibitions, talks, music, sport & theatre events; organizing get-togethers plus booking venues, accumulating equipment & of course Fundraising!

To date we've raised about £1500, two thirds of which we've invested in the Shop & Office so that the Festival has a firm admin & publicity base to operate from. Our Events Fund stands at

only £500 just yet, but as trading builds up and our municipal funding applications duly processed we anticipate the figure will grow several fold. GREEN COLLECTIVE LAND FUND

The question has been asked - and quite rightly - exactly how is money which goes into the Collective Land Fund to be used? And what status, with regard to any future land ownership, do individual subscribers have on the strength of their £1 stake? But to these apparently simple questions there are no simple answers - which is perhaps a good thing at this stage: the nature of the fund can grow with the fund itself.

The intention is to set up a charitable Trust, which can administer the money and take ownership of land and property on behalf of the Collective. At present, with only a small amount of money in the fund, there are so many variables and so many possibilities. For instance:

- How large and how fast will the fund grow?
- What sort of property, at what sort of price, is likely to be available in what part of the country, and when?
- What are our priorities in terms of land use - a home base and meeting place? A Gathering site? Agricultural land? Or what combination of these?
- What new possibilities would be open if and when Charitable Trust status is attained?
- What is the position of individuals who have access to more substantial resources and who would like to put money into such a project (as some have suggested they may)?

There are many possibilities. For instance, we could at an early stage invest in a relatively cheap property which could be used as a venue for benefit gigs and the like, to raise more money. Or we could wait until there are a given number of subscribers and then suggest that everyone invests, say, £50 to create a large fund, with a minimum return on the money being effectively a life-long season ticket to Green Gatherings. Or the fund could be one partner with other interested parties in purchasing land and/or property. Or we could work on a combination of these and other ideas.

For the time being, it seems more important to put by some money so that we are no longer an infinite distance away from any of these conclusions; which is the thinking behind putting £1 from every £5 subscription into a Land Fund. And it seems important that those who subscribe should have some control over how the money is used; and perhaps the best thing at this stage would be to make this a general invitation to float more ideas - please send them in. It will also certainly be an important topic for discussion at Collective meetings later in the year.

A key factor in social change from a Green perspective is access to land. We cannot afford to wait till after some far-off utopian revolution, but must use whatever resources we can muster to start building that utopia now. If only in a small way at first, it is not beyond us to start doing something about it.





APPROPRIATE TECHNOLOGY AT GATHERINGS

(Bobby Bazalgette has arranged AT workshops at the Glastonbury Green Gatherings, and created the hot baths and showers which were in the Green Field at this year's CND festival. He runs his own business installing solar heating panels and other domestic applications of soft technology).

People like to see visual displays, but these tend to be expensive and AT is often not visually exciting to people used to TV spectaculars. There is a lot of interest shown in D.I.Y. solar panels, and wind generators, and if there is someone on hand with some experience people who need information and encouragement will gain a lot.

Finding people with knowledge and experience available for workshops is the problem. I wrote to an enormous number of people who are working in this field, and most of them did not bother to reply. The only people who came along and did workshops by arrangement were contacted by word of mouth through friends. A very exciting contribution was also made by people who attended as 'members of the public' but who were attracted by advance publicity for the event. This kind of contributor cannot be predicted, but has formed a major part of the event at both Green Gatherings I have been involved with.

The message seems to be to concentrate on attracting the right sort of people to the gathering. Make them feel they can participate rather than just spectate. Also use what contacts you have or can find; I have a very large contact list of people who are associated with AT, and I could make up a very short list of people who I know would take an interest in coming along to do workshops at events.

One of the most rewarding aspects of holding workshops is the degree of interest and informed ideas found in all sorts of people.

Money. Where people need money to attend they usually make it quite clear in advance. It does not appear to be necessary to offer money as an inducement. In fact if you do you are likely to get asked for more afterwards as well. So let people ask for what they need - and then assess your requirements. This helps keep budgets down.

Some ideas for AT participation/demonstrations

For kids (3-10 years old): Making a water turbine.

Materials: One gallon or two gallon plastic container
Coat hanger wire (grom coat hangers !)
Yoghurt cartons
Large corks (used or unused)
String

Tools: Pliers, stanley knife, scissors.

Method (see diagram over page): Cut a 4" square hole in the front of the plastic container to let water escape (an adult or older child should do this for very young children). Cut the yoghurt carton into four to make curved blades. Cut four channels down the length of a cork with the stanley knife, then make a hole down the centre with the wire. The blades can then be slotted into the cork to make the turbine.

Put the wire through the cork and make sure the blades are all facing the right way. Make small holes in the sides of the plastic container, in line with the hole at the top, to feed the wire through. Thread the wire in and see that it turns freely. Place under a tap.

Put another cork on one end of the wire protruding from the container, with a piece of string coiled round it and a small weight on the end of the string. When the tap is turned on the turbine should wizz round and can lift the weight on the end of the string !

For older kids (9 yrs and upwards): Hot Air Balloons

This needs a full day (though about 3 hours is sufficient time for actually making a balloon), and a wind-free space with trestle or other tables. Patience and perseverance are required by all.

Materials: Tissue paper, adhesive (PVA, Copydex, or other paper glue which can be watered down), thin card.

Tools: Scissors, glue brushes, pencils.

Method: First make a pattern with plain card. The size will depend on the tissue paper you have. 4 feet long by 18 inches wide is about right. Make it easy multiples of the tissue sheet size (see diagram).

Stick the tissue paper together in pairs, up to 5 segments for each balloon. Select the colour combination at this stage. Each person (or preferably pair) should end up with 5 'orange peel' shaped pieces of tissue the same size. They can all be cut at once by placing the segment pattern on top of the pile; mark out and cut around with scissors.

To stick together use thin glue; brush about 12" down one edge, starting from the point. Line up the point of the next segment and run a finger down the seam. Hold till dry. Then carry on the next 12" until you reach the bottom. As you go down the seam the curve causes one sheet to ride up in the air. Always keep the bit you are glueing flat on the table. The process gets progressively more tricky as you go on to segments 3 and 4, and No 5 back to No 1 is the most difficult of all. Don't try to get it perfect; get it stuck down and then go back afterwards. Patches won't show too much, so keep the cut-offs for possible repairs.

When the tissue envelope is complete, cut a thin piece of card to go around the bottom. A strip 2" wide is fine. Stick this on and trim off the tissue.

Flying the balloon. For this you require a still day. There is no point trying to fly balloons in even a light breeze. You need a column heater, electric or paraffin which can be stood outside. Fill the envelope with hot air, as hot as possible, by holding the balloon over the heater. When it's really hot - let go. These balloons will fly up to 200 feet high if the air in them is hot enough. Remember that wet glue is heavy - let the balloon dry thoroughly before test flying.

Wood burning stoves from junk.

This is for all ages, and demonstrates the principles of efficient wood burning, re-using junk, and making something practical which can be used for camping.

Materials: Old tins. Some small bits of wood, paper, matches.

Tools: A 'nibbler' (Monodex minor) or tin snips. Pliers.

Method: The principles which can be demonstrated are (1) pre-heating air fed into a fire, (2) Long flame path, (3) After-burning for complete combustion, (4) Complete combustion gives smokeless fire.

For a very simple jam tin stove get a large (2 lb) jam tin. Cut one small hole at the bottom of one side about 1½" square. Another hole near the top lets smoke out when a kettle is placed on top - and also allows fuel to be added. This is a simple stove that can be made in a few minutes, and which will boil a kettle very quickly on a few small sticks. Much more effective than an open fire.

Oil can stove. Rectangular oil tins make a larger version of the same. Remove the top, cut a hole near the bottom and one on the opposite side near the top.

25 litre can. A round can can demonstrate very efficient burning for large heat requirements. Remove the top and cut two L-shaped slots down the sides and along the bottom. Fold in the sides and, using pliers, clip the free ends over a little so they don't flap about.

This stove generates a vortex flame path, as the air is drawn in from both sides. A very efficient high power burner for space heating !
