DEVON MEETING

Finch Foundry Museum, Sticklepath, 4th November 1989

A tour of the museum added interest to this meeting at which most of the Devon Local Parties, old and new, were represented and gave a report of their current situation.

After discussions on a variety of topics, the following agreements emerged:-

- 1) Further co-operation and association between Devon parties was desirable, but the current uncertainty over the final SW Area composition and constitutional arrangements precluded any immediate decision on the details of a Devon Green Party Federation.
- 2) It was felt necessary to have a Devon Press Agent, and Roger Giles was elected to serve.
- 3) It was felt desirable to have a Devon Election Agent, although no nominations were immediately forthcoming. Chris Dent volunteered to read the proposed job description! Anyone else interested in this post, please contact Alan Toothill.
- 4) Catherine Simmons of North Devon L.P. was willing to help parties by talking on her experiences of electioneering and being a local councillor.
- 5) Efforts will be made to hold public meetings and otherwise stimulate the setting up of a local party to cover the Teignmouth area. Exeter L.P. promised support after the May elections were out of the way.
- 6) A press statement would be issued condemning the Devon County Council's plans to sell off small holdings. (Roger Giles also was heard on Radio Devon 8th November on this subject).
- 7) The next meeting would consist of a workshop day at Exeter. (Now scheduled for 27th January - q.v.)
- 8) By January it should be clearer how SW Area will evolve. If it was felt necessary to hold a meeting in February to discuss Devon's role in the new area, this would be fixed at the workshop meeting. Alan Toothill would welcome for circulation any specific proposals that were sent to him.

SW AREA MEETING BRISTOL 14th October 89

Following the decision at the Wolverhampton Conference to set up a new Severnside area the last meeting of the old SW Area took place in Bristol on 14th October at the Shepherds Hall. In fact for most of the day there were two meetings, the new Severnside area (Glos., Avon and Somerset) and the remainder in a new, and probably temporary SW Area (Cornwall, Devon, Dorset and Wiltshire).

A motion was passed to allow both Dorset and Wiltshire to leave the new SW Area provided that South Central Area will accept them, and subject to a postal ballot of members. This was passed with just one abstention and no votes against.

Jamie McMillan had done a lot of work on the organisation and circulated job descriptions for Area and County co-ordinators, plus one for a new area agent. It was also agreed to have the AGM in March.

The reorganisation left the new SW Area without a representative on Green Party Council, so it was decided to appoint someone for the interim until a ballot could be held. Jamie McMillan had decided to resign as the SW Area co-ordinator so an acting co-ordinator also had to be appointed. It was agreed this should be someone in Cornwall or Devon.

There was a long discussion on the SW Area budget and the figures provided by Sue Birley. Some people wanted to increase the expenses for County Co-ordinators from £100 to £200, but it was generally felt that hiring halls, etc., was the responsibility of the local party. Nearly everyone was against raising County Co-ordinators' expenses, with 2 abstentions. A motion to raise the start up grant for new local parties had much more support as without it there would be no new branches. The proposal to raise the start up grant for new local parties from £25 to £50 with effect from 15th October 1989 was carried with Howard Hoptrough voting against and two abstentions.

Pete Marjoram, who has been doing tremendous work helping new branches start up in East Cornwall, raised the subject of local electoral pacts at the General Election. The general opinion on this was against although no hard and fast rules were given. Many constituencies still have not short listed their prospective parliamentary candidates.


There was applause for Howard Hoptrough who recently won a seat on Penzance Town Council in a bye election there. Reports were given from the various local parties including Exeter who hope to contest all twelve seats next year.

In the afternoon at the meeting of all the old SW Area, Howard Hoptrough challenged the accuracy of the minutes. He said it had been proposed and seconded at the last meeting that David Oddie be the East Cornwall Co-ordinator and Howard Hoptrough be the West Cornwall Co-ordinator. After some discussion during which it was pointed out, several times, that Area cannot appoint co-ordinators, the following was passed:- "The minutes be amended to say Cornwall had reported back that co-ordinators had been appointed for East and West Cornwall and noting that Area cannot appoint County Co-ordinators".

Reports were given about all the new Local Parties. Howard Hoptrough said the first page of the October SW Area Newsletter was inaccurate as to what had happened in Cornwall. After some discussion it was agreed that the newsletter was only as accurate as the contributions sent in.

The last part of the afternoon went back to new SW Area and constitutional matters were discussed, especially the motion put forward by Derek Wall (see October Newsletter for this motion).

The Queen's Green Speech.

Barbara Bloomfield, the UK Green Party Press officer, arranged a Press Conference in London on Monday 20th November. This was to unveil the Queen's Green Speech - an outline of the legislation the Green Party would introduce to protect the environment if asked to form a government. The aim was to go beyond the empty rhetoric of the other (grey) parties and present a coherent package of measures which could be taken NOW to lessen and reverse the serious damage we are causing to our environment. Among the proposals were a gradual reduction in energy consumption to 50% of present levels, an end to all new motorway building, tax incentives to promote conservation, a new Ministry for Energy Conservation.

The speech was presented by Jean Lambert, a Green Party Speaker and our representative at the European Parliament. Jean Lambert says "The Green Party will be taking over government at a time of global crisis; we are confident we can meet the challenge".

SUPPORT MINORITY LANGUAGES.

The Green Party Manifesto for a Sustainable Society (page 107, Resolution 108) states "The Green Party believes that the native minority languages of the UK must not be allowed to decline any further and that where possible we should encourage their rejuvenation". The native languages referred to are the Goidelic (or Gaelic) group of Irish, Manx and Scottish, and the Brythonic (or British) languages of Wales and Cornwall (& Brittany).

The word "British" now has other meanings, but until about 150 years ago it was used to refer to languages. For example a dictionary which would now be called "English-Welsh" would have been called "English-British".

Brittany was colonised by the emigrations from Cornwall and is the diminutive form of Britain. In Cornish it is called "Little Britain", hence the island we live on is Big (or Great) Britain.

The word Cornwall is usually explained as the "horn shaped land of Wales", the "Wal" in both Wales and Cornwall being the same. In Saxon times the venerable Bede referred to Cornwall as West Wales.

Tiverton Green Party.

Tiverton Green Party newsletter is produced by Susan Proud (0884 821164) and they recently held their first ever AGM. Jo Clarke (0398 31981) and Mandy Powell (257324) were elected co-chairs, as is done on Green Party Council and stimulates thoughts about sharing work and making the organisation Green as well as the policies. The Press officer is Val Barbier (254639) and a list of other officers was given in their newsletter.

Mandy gave a personal insight on the Green Party Conference at Wolverhampton as very good, but it was still (as all other parties are) predominantly male, white and middle class.

Tiverton's next meeting was on 14th No-

ember and this included a discussion on the Basic Income Policy Scheme.

To quote the writer Margaret Atwood on the environment (or what keeps her awake at night) "It's change or die. If everybody's dead we won't be talking about human rights or women's rights or medical concerns or illiteracy or any of the other horrible problems that we face. So let's deal with that first. Everything that we eat, breathe, drink, wear, ultimately every thing that we come in contact with and sustains our lives stems from nature and if you obliterate nature, there goes your food base. Sorry, sorry Mrs. Thatcher".

Sharon (see contact address page) wrote that Vandana Shiva is a physicist, philosopher and feminist. She has a mind of the first order combining intellect with spirit and using science shows white, masculine science to be the linear, unthinking, unfeeling road to disaster that it surely is. Martin Hughes-Jones went to a seminar on the local economy given by officers of Mid Devon Council and was told by the Chief Executive that "an economy must either expand or go into recession".

The Conservative claim to be the real party of the environment. Road building will protect the environment, Michale Portillo of the Department of Transport said to hushed MPs "because fast moving traffic doesn't emit as much dangerous gas as traffic stuck in traffic jams"!!!

Cornish Green Party.

A County meeting, comprising of members from many local Green Party Branches throughout Cornwall, was held at St.Pirans Church Hall, Truro, on 26th October 1989.

The meeting was called mainly to discuss the election of a County Co-ordinator, but also to get to know each other and to organise how we can work together more effectively as a group and promote the Green Party.

Up until now the task of County Co-ordinator has been carried out on an Ad Hoc basis by Howard Hoptrough in collaboration with Pete Marjoram. But the need has arisen to properly elect and decide on the functions of the County Co-ordinator, to decide how the job will be funded, its terms of office and means of election.

Duncan McCannis very kindly came down from Bath to Chair the meeting, which turned out to be a very lively and well attended (55). Sue Birley also very kindly came down to give advice and comment from her experience as County Co-ordinator for Wiltshire. After much discussion concerning the function of the job, it was decided, that due to the length (and breadth in places) of Cornwall, we needed two Co-ordinators; one for the West and one for the East. As the meeting was not called specifically to elect a Co-ordinator, Howard Hoptrough for the West and Pete Marjoram & David Oddie for the East agreed to temporarily Co-ordinate until they were able to call a meeting within their regions so that someone could be democratically elected, and terms of office, means of election and fund raising for the position could also be discussed.

Other ideas discussed were, a County Newsletter, County Speakers, and a member from each branch to be responsible for finding out about vacancies coming up on local councils, etc.. Falmouth-Camborne Branch have also organised the printing of a Cornish Green Party T-Shirt, samples of which will be brought back to the next meeting.



Falmouth-Camborne GP.



At their meeting on 13th November 1989 about twenty people listened to Councillor Frank Williamson from Okehampton. All agreed it was an excellent address and people were talking about it for days afterwards. Frank didn't think all power was in Westminster and emphasised how we can all affect big companies by choosing what we buy. He saw economic and international events keeping a basically hostile press off the Green Party, but this "honeymoon" won't last. The Green Party had come second in Devon, but the rise of the Labour Party was distracting interest away from the challenge to about 30 Tories from Devon to Wiltshire. Frank talked about the INTERCONNECTIONS of environmental matters. He had spent 16 years in Australia and seen 40,000 years of Aboriginal understanding steam rolled. Aborigines don't even have a word for land belonging to them, they see themselves as looking after a territory. On SCALE OF ENTERPRISE Frank mentioned a "lot of insane activity", for example in transport, where vegetables are sent to London for packing and then sent back again. Also he mentioned biscuits being sent long distances by lorries. These of course are just a few points picked out from his address; for the overall view why not invite him to YOUR Branch? Highly recommended.

LIFE, HUMANITY AND EVERYTHING!

LIFE HUMANITY AND EVERYTHING - ITS IN HUGO'S HANDS. So ran the headlines in the Sunday Times (1st October 1989).

Hugo stands for HUMAN Genome Organisation, a £2 billion world-wide research project which will be finished around the turn of the century. It is an attempt to describe the entire DNA code of Homo Sapiens. The code is expected to fill 200,000 pages of small print.

DNA makes up the genes that generate the proteins of every living cell. Prominent cancer researchers are interested in Hugo "it is clear" susceptibility is transmitted genetically from parent to child. Some disease such as cystic fibrosis and sickle cell anaemia are inherited, and many others have strong genetic elements eg. rheumatoid arthritis, heart disease, and many forms of mental illness.

GREEN PARTY COUNCIL Meeting 20th-22nd October 89

Having left St. David's Station in Exeter at 3.05pm on Thursday, to arrive at Hope Station seven hours later and be faced with a two and a half mile walk in the dark and in pouring rain, was not the start one would have wished for the GPC weekend. accompanied by Chris Rose, Party Election Agent - who joined the train at Bristol, I made

it to Castleton Youth Hostel just in time to check in and pop down the road to the local hostelry before closing time. In addition to the Area Rep for the new South West Area (pro tem; see elsewhere in this newsletter for further information on this subject) attending GPC for the first time, many other people were also doing so. The first day had therefore been arranged to enable us to get to know each other, to get to know how GPC functions, and also how we saw the priorities for the Green Party in the next twelve months. The discussion of GPC targets, the feasibility of achieving them, and consideration of organisation of GPC reminded me very much of Management by Objectives operated in a previous incarnation far away from the Green Party. Previous co-chairs and convenors of committee had made themselves available for this day for

debriefing and hand-over. One theme that came over quite often was that being on GPC entails a huge amount of work; whilst we had drawn up a long list of desirable activities the reality was that we would be unable to get very far down the list. Friday ended with a very pleasant couple of hours getting to know each other even better aided by Tetleys Mild.

On Saturday morning the new GPC

took over. During the twelve month period GPC meets four times; there is also a great deal of work done in a large number of committees and working groups. Our first task was to elect three co-chairs. All members of GPC are elected; a number at Conference, a number by postal ballot, and the rest as Area Representatives. All convenors of committees and the co-chairs have to be members of GPC. Last year's co-chairs were no longer eligible as all of them had left GPC.

Before moving on to an election there was considerable discussion on the method of election to be used. The previous day we had talked about the need to be better organised, and in particular that we should match skills to available jobs - "horses for courses". However, a proposal that co-chairs should be elected one at a time with this in mind was lost. I think it is not disputed that there was a far from harmonious relationship between the co-chairs elected by the STV system. The result was that Caroline Lucas became co-chair External, Nick Anderson co-chair Internal and Jo Steranka co-chair Strategy.

Further for convenors took place, mainly uncontested. More interesting was the election of additional speakers. We agreed to confirm three existing generalist speakers (Sarah Parkin, Jean Lambert and David Icke) and to add a further three. Seven contenders all spoke very well as a result of which Jane Alty, Liz Crosbie and Steve Rackett were successful.

It is intended, in addition to the Generalist Speakers, to field a "Shadow Cabinet" of fifteen

Specialist Speakers. It is hoped this will include female speakers in what have traditionally been male preserves such as the Treasury. One of the difficulties will be ensuring that adequate briefing facilities are available. At present the GP has one part time Parliamentary Monitor. We talked frequently of the need for proper research facilities; as you can imagine the stumbling block is lack of finance. To hone the television skills of speakers two training workshops have been arranged for November and January (this second one in Bristol). Places may be available to local party activists. Contact me for details.

We began to plough through minutes of various committees having considered the remit of many of them. It was agreed that Campaigns Committee would produce (if possible) material suitable for local party campaigns (e.g., a local campaign kit). This committee has been working on two activities which will be pushed in the near future. A Green Program of Government (our alternative to the Queen's Speech) will be launched at a Press Conference around about 20.11.89; and a Diebacked Paper Private Bill will see the light of day soon. Details will be mailed to local parties.

The Membership Growth WG minutes prompted a discussion of political education of members and how to involve them in activities. Half the party membership have been members for less than a year and have had no "education". The possibility of a special leaflet and the designation of an Education Officer is being considered. Iain Brodie, 32, Stanley Road, Brighton, BN1 4NJ (tel 0273 692338) is co-ordinating ideas.

Much of Sunday afternoon was taken up with financial matters. GPC has to fix the GP budget for six month periods. The budget proposed was based on expenditure being met by a big increase in membership subscriptions. We felt that this could be a rather dangerous piece of accountancy - and therefore lopped some £20,000 of expenditure off the account budgets. Hopefully it will go back in to the next one.

Of course we undertook much other business not detailed here. If the report is not to be selective it would fill the whole of this newsletter and much more besides. Having given some background information about how GPC works, future reports (there should be one in each SW Newsletter) should include more details of discussion taken.

I feel it is important that Area Reps should report back to and be accountable to the membership. I would be pleased to make available minutes and reports of GPC wishing to see them.

Funny weather again!

A REPORT ON THE EDALE STRATEGY CONFERENCE 27th - 29th OCTOBER.

"Few of us actually realise the extent of the ecological crisis that is upon us" said Bryg Oubridge in his opening address. *"The climatic change we're predicting is the greatest since the end of the last Ice Age,"* he went on, and you have to go back 125,000 years to find even half as much warming - a time when hippopotami and lions roamed the Home Counties! He pointed to a stream of "natural" disasters that seemed to be happening with increasing frequency world-wide, and even to recent extreme weather conditions in this country as evidence that the crisis that ecologists

warned about twenty years ago was now upon us.

And sure enough, to add to Brigg's arguments, it poured and poured, and hurricane force winds hit the south coast. Was it coincidence, or does living in a tepee give you special powers? Whatever it was, it concentrated the minds wonderfully, and we were in just the right frame of mind to take on board David Taylor's idea of a "Crisis Community" within the Green Party alongside the Policy Community. The idea was to keep tabs on the latest expert predictions of what was happening globally in ecology and politics, and to advise the policy groups so that a coherent programme of policy can be drawn up. *"At the moment we simply don't know what's going to hit us first - will it be famine, rising sea levels, resource depletion, or what?"*, explained David at a workshop on Global Wealth.

Another view that was widely shared was that of a two pronged attack on politics over the next ten years. The first was the straight forward electioneering, to keep up the pressure, keep shifting the agenda our way, and win some power. But the other prong, argued strongly by David Taylor, was to start building coalitions with other parties and pressure groups, and to try and to overcome traditional party loyalties which are often obstacles to real change. This second strategy could be seen as *"preparing for government"* in a way which was both realistic and radical - in that it is moving beyond present day politics.

Actually how to build these bridges and links was a subject of much debate in the workshops. Involving pressure groups and Green Parties across the globe in our policy making was probably the idea that had most widespread support. Yes, we must be in charge of our policy making, but that doesn't stop us seeking outside help and expertise. *"Advisors advise, but conference decides"*, to paraphrase a one time Prime Minister.

All this can of course be done at local level - and can be started now! Talking doesn't necessarily involve dealing. And many of the national pressure groups have local branches who are often delighted to be approached by local Green Parties to talk policy or plan local joint action. And pressure groups can mean anything from CND to the NFU - don't just talk to "the Green Movement". Local parties can also twin with Greens abroad, and can also make community links with the third world.

The conference was nicely organised, in a great setting with hills and autumn colours round about, and personally I found it the most positive and energising Green Party event I have yet been to. We were kept busy in working groups more or less all of the time - and the recommendations from about 30 of these will be available from the strategy working group in due course, and will be summarised and put to conference for a decision.

In a way, it's a pity the conference didn't happen a few weeks later, because since then we have seen the end of Thatcherism, nuclear power, the Iron Curtain, NATO, the Warsaw Pact, and the EEC as we know it. On second thoughts, perhaps with the current level of global political analysis in the party, we might not have noticed any way.

We do need a million pounds before the next general election, though. But that's only 100 jumble sales every week for the next two years - if we're still all here by then.

Agriculture.

ORGANIC MILK. Demand for Organic Milk is outstripping supply since the launch earlier this year of the speciality milk by the dairy giant UNIGATE; the volume has been doubled in an attempt to keep customers happy. The milk sells for 40p per half litre.

STRAW BURNING. The National Farmers Union (NFU) put forward the concept of a straw burning licence at their meeting in Mid-October. This was in the face of a total ban called for by the National Society for Clean Air and the Royal Commission on Environmental Pollution. The MAFF are also in favour of a licence.

Straw burning causes a wide variety of air pollution including acid rain and the release of greenhouse gases. It is completely banned under Soil Association Standards.

FACTORY FARMING FACTS

(A) Beef cattle (non-organic) are fed antibiotics in their feed.

(B) BSE or Bovine Spongiform Encephalitis infects one in every thousand cows. The cause is the feed which the cows eat. It includes the ground up remains of other animals including sheep that have died with "scrapie", the sheep version of BSE. Experts on Creutzfeldt Jacob Disease say it is the human version of BSE.

(C) BST or Bovine Somatotrophin is a genetically engineered hormone that boosts milk yield. It is being tested secretly on farms in Britain and the milk sold without identification. The use of BST will eventually drive the small farms out of business. A similar produce FST (porcine Somatotrophin) may be introduced for pigs.

(D) Less than a tenth of British abattoirs have a licence to sell meat abroad. The Meat and Livestock Commission claims that the abattoirs don't want to export and never apply. The truth is, because they are mostly old, cramped and dirty they wouldn't pass EC Standards/ The only safe choices are to avoid meat or buy it from a legitimate organic producer.

PETER BARCLAY lives on a small holding near Praze-an-beeble, Cambon, Kernow. He is the Agricultural Correspondent of the "Cornish Alternative".

The Cornish Farmer & Grower magazine, published by the NFU, for September 1989 had an article on ALDRIN: "So, Friends of the Earth want to remove all the top soil in Cornwall contaminated with Aldrin. That means 2,000 acres to a depth of six inches, which works out roughly to three and a half million tonnes of soil. If they could find someone to pay for it and if they could find somewhere to put it, and if they

could find "clean" soil to replace it, then perhaps we should all diversify into the contracting business. Anybody got any spare JCBs?"

On another page the magazine gave details of MAFF arrangements to dispose of Aldrin. Only chemicals declared to MAFF by 4th August 1989 are eligible; only chemicals in unopened containers will be eligible; only chemicals from participating companies will be eligible. The reimbursement is 30p per kilogram.

The ADAS "CORNWALL FARMING MENTOR" magazine (MAFF) for October 1989 gave advice from an Entomologist on Barley Yellow Dwarf Virus (BYDV) to which all cereals are susceptible. "It is essential to apply a recommended aphicide spray to all winter cereal crops..." Marketing grants are available for "companies or individuals with the necessary experience or expertise..."

More hopefully, for the planet, the West Penwith ESA was designated in 1987 and 160 farmers have voluntarily entered into 5 year agreements with MAFF. The coastal heather, enclosed farmland and the moor, together with the abundance of archaeological remains are the result of continuous farming since pre-Celtic times. The MAFF "Mentor" said "Their survival depends on the continuation of traditional farming systems".

Wiltshire.

Wiltshire is represented in this issue by Swindon Green News sent by Bill Hughes. The leading article by Bill in the October issue was on the mounting volume of traffic in Swindon and the need for a comprehensive transport policy. There is a possibility of a new light railway for Swindon instead of dual carriageways and flyovers. Wednesday 29th November was a talk about transport with speakers from FoE and Transport 2000. Bill says that the present general election deposit is £500, but he has grave suspicions it will be raised to £1,000. The 6th Swindon Green Conference took place on Saturday 30th September in the Friends Meeting House. Speakers included Philip Greig and Helen Browning, local party members and organic growers. Also Bob Waller of Bath Green Party who was the editor of the Soil Association Journal some years back, and Kate Freeman who is a member of the Devizes and Marlborough Green Party and runs an organic shop in a converted cow shed at Etchilhampton. Swindon Green Party are involved with objections to a company treating heavy industrial waste. On Thursday 7th December they have a party at 18, Goddard Avenue, Old Town, and on Saturday 9th December a Green Fair at Christchurch Hall, Devizes

East Devon Green Party.

East Devon Green Party intend to select a candidate for Honiton for the General Election by next spring as their contribution to a "full slate" in Devon. Launceston Green Party.

The recently formed Launceston Green Party held a public meeting on Thursday 9th November with David Oddie from Calstock as speaker. From Cluny Hill Witches were rolled in stout Barrels through which Spikes were driven. Where the Barrels stopped they were burned with their mangled contents. This stone marks the site of one such burning.


Does anyone know of any similar sites in the SW where local councils have erected, or permitted such plaques?

GREENLINES No. 48.

The November 1989 issue of the North Devon Green Party newsletter marked the TENTH ANNIVERSARY of the North Devon Green Party. They first contested an election in 1979, but it was not until 1983 that Peter Hames and Peter Christie were elected to Braunton and Bideford councils respectively, and Annie Bainbridge was returned unopposed to S.Nolton council. Peter Christie became Mayor of Bideford - Britain's first Green Mayor - an event marked by a vegetarian inaugural banquet.

In May 1985 eight greens were arrested after handing out leaflets at the launch of a nuclear waste carrier from Appledor. The police later admitted wrongful arrest and settled out of court with a monetary payment.

In 1987 Catherine Simmons convincingly beat a Labour candidate to be the Local Parties first District Councillor.



WORKSHOPS

At the Devon Green Party meeting at Sticklepath on 4th November, Exeter Green Party undertook to organise a series of training workshops. The thinking was that the Green Party has a majority of members who have been in the Party for less than a year - a large number of people to become involved and make a contribution, but perhaps unsure how to do so; also that there are a number of local GPs in Devon who have not been in existence for very long and could benefit from some of the expertise (?) accumulated by such as Exeter GP who have been active for more than 10 years.

WHY I WANT TO BE SOUTH WEST AREA REP BY ROGER GILES.

At the South West Area meeting in Bristol on 14th October I was elected Area Rep pro tem. I hope you will vote for me to continue in the post after you have read the following notes.

BIOGRAPHY. Green Party life member. First involvement in 1979 General Election campaign. Past experience includes Exeter Eco Secretary 4 years; Exeter Eco Election Agent; candidate in Exeter City Council and Devon County Council elections. Press officer for Devon Euro candidate Peter Christie in 1984 and 1989; organized successful Nuclear Free Exeter campaign 1982/83 which saw a 10,000 signature petition (the largest ever in Exeter either before or since) presented to Exeter City Council. Currently Exeter Green Party Press officer.

Between 1985 and 1988 I was rather inactive in GP due to running a vegetarian/ whole-food restaurant single handed. Aged 42; hospital administrator for 16 years; vegetarian for 8 years. Devon AAA Marathon Championship runner-up 1986; third place 1989.

The sheer volume of work to be undertaken by GPC was rather off putting on my first attendance. However, I do think that I can cope with a very heavy work load, and make a useful contribution to the Green Party nationally. Having been to a Media Committee meeting I am quite excited at the prospect of being very involved in its work for the next twelve months.

I see the role of Area Rep - in addition to a contribution to the work of GPC - as being the means of communication between local members and parties and the Green Party nationally.
