

75 years of War and Peace

The National Peace Council was founded in 1908 at an international peace congress in Caxton Hall, London. One of our first resolutions was against the spending of £63 million on war preparations.



As Europe prepared for the first world war, we urged co-operation, not conflict ... We campaigned against conscription during that war ... We argued against German re-armament in the Thirties ... We held a peace-aims conference during the second world war and issued a series of pamphlets on that theme ... We opposed the subsequent cold war and the Suez conflict in the 1950's ... We protested against the military intervention in Vietnam and Czechoslovakia in the 1960's ... And we consistently work to educate people in the ways of peace as the super-powers edge us all towards the final war.

Great names have been associated with the National Peace Council ... Leonard Woolf, HG Wells, Lord Noel-Baker, J Middleton-Murry, Lord Boyd-Orr, Victor Gollancz, Lord Ritchie-Calder, Lord Soper ...

How the National Peace Council serves the peace movement

Serving our members

Since the 1960's, single-issue campaigns have come to the fore and the issues themselves have become more complicated. When our members began asking us to provide reliable, regular information, and news about each other's policies and activities, our priorities changed. Now one of our main jobs is to provide that information, to act as a clearinghouse, and to build up our links with organisations in related fields. In effect, we are a servicing organisation working behind the scenes.

We help by keeping our members informed; by keeping them up-to-date locally, nationally and internationally; by representing their interests and putting their point of view on issues of mutual concern; and by encouraging new initiatives and new peace groups. 120 national and local organisations are members of the National Peace Council. They include peace groups, trade unions, political groups and churches; environmental, human rights and third world development organisations; women's groups and sections of the co-operative movement.

Information

Every month we issue a mailing that is widely recognised as the best independent source of news and comment about the peace movement and peace issues. The mailing contains our Newsletter; information on new policies and initiatives; and special briefings on current topics that range from Northern Ireland to the Falklands and the Lebanon, from nuclear disarmament and nuclear power to world development and human rights.

Co-operation & Representation

The National Peace Council is a regular forum where co-operation amongst member organisations can be forged.

Through our representation internationally, the British peace movement is linked to other independent, non-aligned organisations in the fields of peace, disarmament, energy and human rights. We are members of the International Peace Bureau and the Special Non-Governmental Organisations Committee on Disarmament. And we attended the UN Special Sessions on Disarmament in 1978 and 1982. The National Peace Council does not duplicate the work of its more public member organisations, such as CND. Our job is to help make co-operation and co-ordination amongst them and the rest of the movement easier and more effective. We sponsor the Campaign Against the Arms Trade. And we work closely with the United Nations Association, members of the Human Rights Network, the UK Standing Conference on World Development and a growing number of environmental groups.

Education & Research: The United World Trust

The United World Trust is the National Peace Council's educational and research body which has legal charitable status. Set up in 1955, the Trust first became known for its annual conferences for diplomats on international issues, and for its weekend conferences for trainee teachers organised with the London University Institute of Education. Trust publications include "Towards Disarmament: the United Nations Second Special Session and Beyond", published in 1981 as a handbook for teachers.

Gifts to the United World Trust can be made by Deed of Covenant.

Bishop Trevor Huddleston asks you to support the National Peace Council

When the National Peace Council was started 75 years ago, the first world war was only six years away. Preparations were already in hand. The arms manufacturers were promoting arms sales. The propaganda machines were busy fanning public hatreds and prejudices.

Today, we live once more with the threat of impending world war. Once again, the politicians and the arms trade fan the flames of violence and the propaganda intensifies. But this time, as you well know, the survival of the world itself is at stake.

Throughout my lifetime, the National Peace Council has consistently argued for the ways of peace. It has been a bedrock of the peace movement. It has offered continuity, guidance, support. And since the new generation of peace organisations has emerged, it has helped to promote new campaigns and develop new areas for action.

At this critical time, the peace movement must be able to rely on the Council to sustain, even extend, its services. We must provide the contact and the information. We must speak up for the collective concerns of the movement.

We are well aware of the needs. What we lack is the money to respond adequately. To be precise, we know that we will have to raise \pounds 50,000 in 1983 if we are to do our job properly. The need is real. And it is urgent.

That is why I am asking every organisation and every individual who cares about peace to respond to my appeal. You may be able to help us just this once. Or you may want to subscribe regularly as a member. Either way, I do urge you to be as generous as you can. Not by depriving other peace groups of your support. But by giving something extra to the National Peace Council in this our 75th anniversary year.
